RE: Comments on January 2019 Draft California 2030 Natural and Working Lands Climate Change Implementation Plan

To whom it may concern,

Climate change is the most significant threat our forests has ever faced, and the most pressing environmental challenge for our nation and the world. In the absence of clear federal leadership, states hold the key to continued progress on developing and implementing ambitious climate action strategies. This includes the potential to drive emissions reductions and enhanced carbon sequestration through forests and other elements of the land sector. The Draft California 2030 Natural and Working Lands Climate Change Implementation Plan is great example of the crucial role states play.

American Forests stands ready to help the State of California double the pace and scale of forest management and restoration as outlined Implementation Plan.
